The US Dairy Education & Training Consortium (USDETC), formerly known as the Southern Great Plains Dairy Consortium, is a multi-university organization established in 2008 to meet the educational and training needs of the rapidly changing dairy industry. The program is a unique partnership with University and Industry leaders, and a pillar of US dairy sustainability among academia, allied industry and dairy producers.

Mission

The USDETC is organized to provide leadership, support and resources for the development and facilitation of practical, hands-on large herd dairy education and training. Programs are developed in coordination with allied industry, academia and government. The programs are meant to be capstone-learning experiences for advanced college students in Animal Science, Dairy Science and Agbusiness curriculum in preparation for entry into the dairy industry or advanced degree programs.

Center of Excellence

The USDETC Advanced Large Herd Management Program offers strong research based dairy education in a welcoming, friendly environment. Individuals from University faculty and industry collaborate to provide students with unique educational experience and employment opportunities. Courses are taught in the center of the third largest milk shed in the U.S., and credits are applicable to the student's program at their home university.

Mission (continued)

The program strives to unite the best students with best faculty the in а geographical location conducive to hands-on practical teaching through onfarm practicum combined with field trips, laboratories and allied industry interactive experiences.

Courses are coordinated by faculty from participating universities. Instructional faculty are nationally experts recognized from universities and agribusiness. The material presented insures that the latest in technology and information is available to the students.

Due to budget constraints many universities have cut dairy facilities & faculty in an effort to cut costs. These actions have resulted in the loss of many dairy science departments and a diminished emphasis on dairy educational opportunities. The U.S. Dairy Education & Training Consortium is specifically designed to fill this void and to educate and train the next generation of well prepared dairy owners, managers, employees and allied industry personnel. The unique partnership and interaction with our industry sponsors opens the door to many prospective job opportunities.

Two levels of Instruction!

Students with a basic comprehension of the dairy industry, as evidenced by their application, will be placed in **Session I** of the Dairy Consortium. This Session will teach the basic principles of Large Herd Dairy Management. Upon graduation students will be able to evaluate modern dairy management practices. Session II is especially developed for returning students, advanced students, and students expressing an advanced level of dairy management knowledge achieved through working experience in the industry or academics. Session II teaches the evaluation of Large Herd Dairy Management principles &

> concepts. Graduates enter the dairy industry at a managerial level position on dairies or allied industry.





Dairy Consortium achievements

What has the USDETC accomplished since its inception in 2008?

Enrollment numbers show the Dairy Consortium represents a large geographical area of the US:

- 560 students have graduated from the program in 13 years, averaging 50 students per year
- Students have come from 57 different universities Coast to Coast, from the largest Land Grant institutions to small private schools
- 51% of the students come from Texas and New Mexico
- 76% of the students are Animal Science/Dairy Science majors
- 65% of the students are female, 32% male
- ¾ of the students attend Session I and ¼ attends Session II (advanced dairy management)

The USDETC has received a total of 838 applications while only 560 students have been able to attend!

In a recently conducted survey of our former students:

- 62% of the students were still enrolled in school, 38% had found employment.
- Of those still in school 60% was still working on their BS, 18% in grad school, and 22% were able to enter into vet school!
- Of the students in the workforce: about 1/3 were working <u>on a dairy</u> while another 1/3 had found work <u>in a dairy related industry</u>
- 60% of the graduates rate the program Very to Extremely important to their current status
- Almost 80% of the graduates rate the material covered in the class Very to Extremely helpful

Funding the Future

To date, the Dairy Consortium (a 501(c)(3) Non-Profit) has been funded through a combination of Grants (Higher Ed, AFRI-CAP, etc.) and Allied Industry Contributions. Our short-term financial goal is to continue funding the program through grants and contributions (providing scholarship opportunities to support a student (s) at \$3,000/student).

The long-term financial objective for the USDETC is to request leadership gifts to establish legacy endowments. Revenues of these endowments will pay for expenses of the program in its current form, and potential opportunities for replication of the program throughout the US.

VISION:

The US Dairy Education & Training Consortium is building endowment funds and seeking programmatic support to enrich and sustain the current and future education and training programs offered to the US Dairy Industry.

Annual revenues from the endowment funds will nourish the Dairy Consortium in providing programs identified by the producers, trade associations and cooperatives as indicated and requested by the Advisory Board.

Fund revenue may support:

- Recruit & support qualified students with assistantships to attend Dairy Consortium classes.
- Recruit & support exceptional faculty (both academic and allied industry) to teach practical expertise in Dairy Consortium classes and programs
- Efforts to identify industry educational and training needs, and develop curriculum and programmatic efforts to address these needs.

Strategic Analysis:

Strategic SWOT analysis has identified several key factors crucial to continued success of the Dairy Consortium.

Major strengths are:

- 1. Hands-on practical education
- 2. Producer support & engagement
- 3. First class faculty participation
- 4. Allied industry recognition & support
- 5. Location in important US dairy shed
- 6. Low overhead, cost control
- 7. First class Community College support

Some unique opportunities identified:

- 1. Potential for replication across US
- 2. Potential to include workforce training at multiple levels
- 3. Potential to develop a dairy Certification Program
- 4. Potential for a Training Center for Dairy Excellence
- 5. Potential vehicle for research funding
- 6. Potential to address industry issues

Weaknesses and threats are primarily related to limited resources. Revenues from endowment funds will allow more time for programmatic growth and development while controlling overhead costs. Increased funding will allow for strategic expansion of the program to include workforce training and development.
